Medical Certification of Small Aircraft Pilots (BasicMed)

On July 15, 2016, Congress passed legislation to extend the FAA's funding. This legislation, FAA Extension, Safety Security Act of 2016 (FESSA) includes relief from holding an FAA medical certificate for certain pilots.

If you are a USAIG policyholder whose operation qualifies for BasicMed, and you decide to fly under those regulations, rest assured that your USAIG policy does not need to be altered.

If you are not a USAIG customer and have concerns about coverage, ask your broker for a quote from USAIG.
